



NORTH AMERICAN DEVELOPMENT BANK EXECUTIVE REPORT

June 30, 2026

The North American Development Bank (NADBank) is a bilateral financial institution capitalized in equal parts by the governments of the United States and Mexico. Its implementation began in 1994 with headquarters in San Antonio, Texas, and a compact organizational structure, currently totaling 106 employees.

Pursuant to its mandate, NADBank finances the development of environmental infrastructure in the areas of potable water, wastewater treatment and solid waste management, as well as projects aimed at improving air quality, conserving water, reducing energy consumption and developing cleaner energy sources, among others, located within 100 kilometers (about 62 miles) north of the international boundary in the four U.S. states of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California and within 300 kilometers (about 186 miles) south of the border in the six Mexican states of Tamaulipas, Nuevo Leon, Coahuila, Chihuahua, Sonora, and Baja California

To date, NADBank is participating in 340 environmental infrastructure projects with close to **US\$4.4 billion** in loans and grants, of which 97% has been disbursed for project implementation. NADBank participation represents roughly 34% of the total investment in these projects, with approximately 55% going to projects in Mexico and 45% to projects in the United States. A breakdown of NADBank financing by country is shown in the following table.

Of the 340 projects receiving funding from the Bank, 98% are either under construction or have already been completed. Specifically, 299 have been completed, 34 are in various stages of implementation and five are in bidding or final design. Two funded projects were cancelled.

NADBank assists border communities in meeting the challenges of project development and financing through a variety of programs, including:

- **Loan Program** – NADBank provides financing and other financial services to public and private entities for the development and implementation of environmental infrastructure projects with sound financial structures.
- **Border Environment Infrastructure Fund (BEIF)** – The Bank administers grants provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), which can be combined with NADBank financing to make water and wastewater projects more affordable even in the smallest and poorest communities. Through the **Project Development Assistance Program (PDAP)**, the Bank administers technical assistance grants from EPA to support communities in the development of water and wastewater projects that have been prioritized by EPA to receive BEIF grants.
- **Community Assistance Program (CAP)** – NADBank provides grant financing to support the implementation of critical environmental infrastructure projects in the water and solid waste sectors for economically distressed communities in the U.S.-Mexico border region.
- **Water Resiliency Fund (WRF)** – NADBank provides low-interest loans and grant financing to support the implementation of priority infrastructure projects aimed at conserving and diversifying water supply sources for the agriculture sector and communities that are facing severe water shortages due to persistent droughts in the U.S.-Mexico border region.
- **Technical Assistance Program (TAP)** – NADBank provides grants for studies and other initiatives to support project sponsors and border communities develop projects and strengthen their financial performance to ensure the efficient operation of their infrastructure and public services in the long term. As part of this program, the **Utility Management Institute (UMI)** offers an annual series of seminars providing public service managers and their staff an opportunity for professional development aimed at enhancing their managerial and financial skills.
